## Minister's Report

## **Matthew Smith**

## Lead Minister



'In the spirit of reconciliation, Toowong Uniting Church acknowledges the Turrbal and Jagera people as Traditional Custodians of this land. We pay our respect to their Elders past and present and emerging.

It's no small thing to be a community church that has served its neighbours since Toowong Presbyterian church was first established in 1887. That span of time alone is a cause for reflection- and some astonishment — 135 years. To lend context, the original club of another great Australian community group, the Surf Life savers, first started in 1907, some 20 years after the Toowong Presbyterian church was built. Imagine - people gathering on this site, in Jesus' name, for more than 7000 Sundays! While the core business hasn't changed, to live out the Gospel of Jesus through word, witness and worship, our world is of course, a very different place from 1887. A growing challenge is meeting the increasing requirements around physical, legal and safety compliance. Our reporting obligations have placed extra demands on the competencies and focus of our congregation, who all give of their time sacrificially. Church Council is working incredibly hard to provide oversight of the many ministry areas we have at TUC, including current opportunities and investigating future potential areas for serving the community. This is a busy church!

For TUC to continue to grow and thrive as a missional community, everyone is invited to discover fresh and engaging ways to share the good news of Christ. There were so many of you who 'made a way' throughout 2021, you saw the need, then looked for solutions, and you put your hands up to do what was needed. One example is the growth of our live stream ministry. Even though there was more asked of you, still you said "Yes, I'd be pleased to serve." Just as we showed over the last two years that we can rise to face a challenge, before us now is the challenge to grow our mission in our community, while not becoming overwhelmed by our house-keeping.

Reviewing 2021 shows that our community remains woven together, very much alive and eager to be the living proof of the Kingdom of God in our time and place. We are, no doubt, flawed, in many ways. There's an abundance of times we get it wrong, in our personal interactions and even in our responses to the community. We will always need His corrective guidance. Nevertheless, the undeniable miracle persists - we remain in relationship with one other! We continue to live out that commitment - to be a Christ-centred community despite the challenge of a journey with people from different walks of life, completely different to you. The miracle is possible, because Jesus said - if you love me, then I'll be in community with you together. (John 21)

Throughout 2021, there have been so many expressions of this life that Christ has called us to live out. However, for all the words written or preached by a pastor, it's truly only when the Gospel is fleshed-out, lived out, that our actual response as followers of Jesus makes the gospel real and tangible. We all know Lauren has given her absolute best in every task and endeavour for our community, she was a vital member of our Office team and we will all miss her thoughtful designs and visual creativity. Garry Jennings has also completed his ordination formation, and after 4 years as our Office Manager, Garry is called to serve in the wider church as Minister of the Word. We will miss Garry's gifted contribution to our worship ministry, that he and Lauren Murray colead together. Grace Tan joined our team in August and took on our communications and events, doing a great job and sharing her infectious optimism with all. Pam Bennett continues to provide energetic and creative leadership around our playgroup ministry, that she sees as a clear opportunity to welcome the families into Christian community. We are blessed with a team that has the strongest motivations to share their faith in Jesus as saviour and Lord.

## Vision, Mission, Values and Goals

Well, 2021 proved another challenging year with Covid-19 causing personal & face to face gatherings at times to be limited or avoided. That didn't stop Council's consideration of our progress in applying TUC's values and goals.

At our AGM in March 2021 we were called to monitor and encourage the living out of the 'actions' identified as necessary if we are to enact our vision, mission and goals. So during our Council meetings through 2021 and into January and February 2022, Council discussed, reviewed and updated the 'actions'.

This process was encouraging, as we saw the people of TUC actively pursuing our goals and trying new ways and approaches to realize them. Were all the expectations and actions met? Of course not. Some changed, some we were not ready for or more importantly, some we realised were not in God's immediate plan for us.

I think God did show us that the strategy is sound but He also reminded us to continue to look to Him for His way, not ours. Prayer remains a critical part of the strategy – prayer to open our eyes and hearts to God, to look for where He has already prepared the way ahead and also to recognise where we may have marched off on our own.

## People and Activities

#### **Church Council**

Last year it was highlighted that our Church Council is blessed with lovely and talented people with a variety of gifts. It continues to amaze how well these gifts are used to blend and produce fruit for our discussions and decisions. It has to be God at work. I think it's also that the Councillors are listening to Him and sharing in a loving way.

It was a shame to lose Garry Jennings from our Council, as he pursued study and practical undertakings towards becoming a Minister of the Word. Garry's role as Worship Lead also needed to be considered and eventually his office management role too, showing how wide Garry's TUC contribution was.

Our highly skilled Treasurer is continuing in that role but with the busy-ness of a young family, a demanding job and now home repairs, David is standing down as an Elder. He is a significant loss; all of Council thanks him for the time, wisdom and heart he has provided.

This is God's church and I expect we will have great new Elders to add to Council deliberations.

Thank you to Bev Homel who has not only stepped into the Secretarial role fully, and of course contributed fully to Council matters, but is also enhancing the ways we deal with our minutes and other documents. With all meetings going for a considerable time the production of accurate recording of our meetings is not a task to be underestimated, some even being a mix of face to face and Zoom. #### **Ministry**

As ex-officio Council members, our Minister Matt Smith and Families Pastor Clare Hankamer, have yet another call on their valuable time. We would be lost without these two gifted people whose wisdom extends to knowing when to intervene and when to allow the lay people space to discuss and present.

Both Matt & Clare contribute well beyond their paid time but it must be God's love and strength that enables them to continue to bless our church community so much and still find enough time for rest and recovery.

Council has had the advantage of a preliminary look at the results of the Presbytery review. Now that the details are more broadly available you will be able to see why Toowong Uniting is so blessed to have Matt and Clare, serving God and the TUC community in so many ways, giving so much of their lives to produce great outcomes.

#### Worship

Garry Jennings needed to step down from Worship Leadership coordination and we were blessed that Brad Sheen agreed to take on this role. Brad worked with Lauren Murray until Lauren departed in August and then Brad continued on his own. Lots of thanks go to Brad for the wonderful job he continues to do and the way in which the variety of people who participate in leading worship add so much to our Sunday times together.

During the 2021 year we were also blessed with wonderful children's talks which guide all of us, not only our young people. Thanks to the video and live productions from Rob Lord & Bev Homel and others too, including Clare.

We again were blessed with a variety of people presenting the message while Matt of course was our mainstay. Thank you to all who served in this critical part of our worship, where we are able to consider what God is saying to us through His word and perhaps grow in our relationship with Him. We remember our Fijian guests who joined us in June and July and blessed us with their amazing passion to serve God here in Australia.

As well as continuing with our live stream management, Brad Sheen and Luke Reynoldson have extended and developed the team who produce each week our live broadcast outreach. Thanks to the many involved in this amazing expansion of our worship. I'm sure Brad and Luke would enjoy the opportunity to guide any new volunteers to assist.

At our 7 November service we heard that Dianne Hubbard and Jane Trewern had been blessed to visit long term member, Alice Jackson who had just turned an amazing 100 years. The following week, there was more joy as we welcomed eight new baptised members to TUC.



#### **Children & Youth**

With 2021 now in the rear vision, we can appreciate the many facets of childrens' and youth ministry Clare oversaw so well. Two of those were:

Providing a safe environment for the young people (and their parents)

With Covid in evidence, all of the usual activities had to be reconsidered in regard to approving volunteer leaders, assessing whether activities could continue and any additional measures needed. Cleaning was a significant task. Did you know we needed to consider potential misuse of images of children on live streaming recordings and different issues requiring parental understanding and consent?

Looking for opportunities in a year interrupted by Covid-19 restrictions.

Clare successfully ran an on-line Alpha course for playgroup families and also trialled the on-line prayer course. We are blessed indeed!

Council has recently been considering the youth and young adult roles in the realisation that Clare's role is not only extremely broad but expanding. Our relationships with the two child care centres present some missional opportunities and it's clear we need more paid capacity for these areas.

#### **Baptisms**

Reduced Covid restrictions allowed us to celebrate two baptisms in November. Praise God that Evie McLachlan and Ethan Christian were able to be baptised and our

church rejoices as these two young people were welcomed into God's kingdom.

#### Office Team

Much change occurred in 2021. Our multiskilled and very talented Relationships Manager, Lauren Murray was called to a new role at Albert Street Uniting after six years of wonderful service at TUC. Grace Tan agreed to take on much of the role as an interim measure and did such a great job she was retained in the role until she ran out of work visa! Just before the end of 2021, we were blessed to have Madeline Kim accept the redefined role of Ministries and Communications Coordinator, ready to be commence in early 2022.

Garry Jennings was another great part of the office team and his departure in January 2022 has meant yet another change for 2022. Thanks very much to Boram Lee who has been efficiently undertaking the role until a permanent selection is made.

#### **Financial Oversight**

With a change to our financial year now making it from July to June, our budget was approved at the Congregational Meeting in June. Of course this was very well managed and presented by David Vicig our evercapable Treasurer who continues to be able to explain our financial budget and position in a way that allows easy understanding and acceptance. David has also managed to guide Council through the new financial system Xero and the different reporting format, and then highlight any potential issues.

#### **Property Oversight**

While our Property Committee has not been meeting, work has continued to ensure our variety of properties are maintained. It is unfortunate that, due to an alert from Worksafe Queensland, our front sign can't be raised. Thankyou to Peter Asimus who continues to keep our messages updated, despite it being a target for late night letter manipulation. An electronic sign replacement would be wonderful but "out of reach" financially.

On the good news front, Matt was able to report to the December Council meeting that a government grant resulted in solar panels being installed on the church roof. Thanks to Ray Mackenroth for his ongoing attendance to maintenance issues with assistance from Warwick Browne and Matt Smith and also thanks to Peter Asimus who pressure-cleaned our access areas. Our gratitude is also expressed to Luke Reynoldson who installed the projector (donated by Paul Briggs), together with an electronic screen (which Luke donated) and audio mixer in the church hall. A new more automated camera was provided and installed to make it easier to manage video production for our services.

#### **Prayer Group**

The Prayer Group faithfully met every Tuesday morning through Zoom. Prayers were made for those in need in the Toowong community, as well as broader prayer needs. The heartfelt praise and heartled requests are conveyed to God to seek His intervention where needed. Psalm readings often played a role in guiding those praying.

#### **Pastorates**

The Tuesday Pastorate continued to meet, completing 11 years of meeting together. It has been sad to see the recent (2022) finalisation of this group, but as recent Council minutes reflect, it's great that the Tuesday Bible Study has commenced. Presbytery strategic planning has identified that sometimes we need to let go of things we might regard as important, as God has plans for new growth that we don't always see or include in our planning.

#### Safe Church

As mentioned in Children & Youth above, providing a Safe Church is very much a part of our concerns. Covid-19 highlights a number of issues which can even preclude people from attending church. If people can't feel safe crossing our entry threshold, we aren't serving them well. Praise God and praise also all those involved in the live streaming alternative. We are very blessed that our Care & Connect team show the needed love to provide safe church mechanisms. Clare also sees this as a high priority for Children's & Youth Ministry.

#### Presbytery

It was a little better in 2021 in that 3 of the 4 Bremer-Brisbane Presbytery meetings were held face-to-face at Glebe Road in Ipswich (One was through Zoom). There is much to learn from Presbytery meetings, not the least of which is how blessed we are at TUC. Matt Smith, Jo Reynoldson and Will Stewart were usual attendees from TUC, Jo playing a leadership role in Presbytery Youth Ministry. One of the positive plans by our Presbytery is the commitment to plant 3 new churches by 2026, with Ripley

already known to be one of the areas. Plans are also focussed on Pastoral Care, Continuing Education for Ministers, Annual Reviews and looking at broader and different ways to financially invest in ministry.

#### Missional Activities

#### Playgroup

It was wonderful that Pam Bennett became leader of the Friday Play group in July, while Clare continued to lead Thursday's activity. Even though Covid-19 prevented physical get-togethers for a time and resulted in much more effort, especially in cleaning, this community outreach seems to be highly valued and provides а wonderful opportunity for parents to link to the church. Clare's use of the on-line Alpha Course for interested mothers is a great testament to this. Thanks to both Clare and Pam and also all those volunteers who assisted.



#### LoveToowong

Again in 2021 there was good financial support to assist those in desperate need either directly or indirectly through Covid-19. The probity team overseeing the allocation of funds comprised Ben Hankamer, Sue O'Brien, Bev Homel, Dianne Hubbard and Matt Smith. Thank you so much to these people who have had the challenging task of assessing to whom funds should be provided – but wonderful that TUC was able to provide help in this way.

#### **English Conversation**

Jane Trewern has both the heart and skills to lead this group so well. While Covid-19 meant numbers of "students" were lower, their consistent attendance demonstrated that they value the opportunity to enhance their English speaking. It didn't stop there though. Quite a number attended and even served in the Community Morning Tea events. Jane has reported separately and in more detail but thanks go to her great leadership and to Jill Lam, Grace Tan, Carol McClymont, Laurel Asimus, Berliyn Miller-Morrison (from another church) & Will Stewart.





#### **Community Morning Tea**

While working hard herself, Wendy Geldenhuys grew a wonderful team to support her in enabling the expanded outreach of this monthly event. With varied and interesting speakers accompanying the great food, coffee and tea, this monthly event proved increasingly popular and saw quite a number of people from outside the church attending. Thanks to Wendy for looking to involve many of different ages in this event and making the outreach such a success.

#### **Connect Brunches**

Covid-19 prevented a number of these welcoming events occurring but we praise the Care & Connect Team who still look out for and provide a welcome to those new to TUC.

#### The Garden & TUC

Carly Kies with her smiling face is a regular part of the TUC community personally and that has maintained our strong link with The Garden. We pray that 2022 will see greater opportunity for The Garden to expand their gentle welcome and guidance to students to introduce them to Jesus.



#### **Outback Futures and TUC**

While our connection to Outback Futures was more limited during 2021, we continue to pray for their wonderful work. Those attending Community Morning Tea in November were able to hear from Lea Yettica-Paulson who works with Outback Futures as their First Nations Partnership Coordinator. Her work and stories showed our Australian community still has much further to go to walk in partnership with First Nations people.

#### The Korean Congregation

We have continued to be blessed by Jisu Shin and Grace Kim as they regularly lead worship so well. They are an invaluable link to the Korean Congregation with whom we continue to share services every year. Additionally from 2022 we have another great connection through Boram Lee working in the office. We pray that we can find enhanced ways to express our worship together and learn from each other in the year ahead.

#### **School Chaplaincy & TUC**

It's great that TUC is able to continue to support Toowong Academy Chaplain, Mandy Chiang in the wonderful way she provides a weekly breakfast for the students. Through Clare's coordination, TUC was also once again a part of the Chaplaincy walk fundraiser. The connection with BBC remains strong and the boarders joined our service in July, complete with piper. Please pray for chaplains throughout Queensland schools, especially our own Wendy Browne.

## **TUC Property Missional Considerations**

#### **Child Care Centres & Queensland Synod**

Of significance is that UCA, Queensland Synod has been reviewing the 27 childcare centres operating on UCA properties through Queensland. An important review was developed for them by Reg Gully and his report, amongst other things, identified shortcomings.

Subsequently the childcare regulator expressed concerns so the Uniting Education Early Learning (UEEL) division was created to take responsibility for and oversee management of all of these 27 centres, including Toowong Child Care and Jahjumbeen.

A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was completed between UEEL and TUC in early September. We were blessed to have

**Future Child Care Centres and TUC** 

This Queensland Synod UEEL initiative interfaces with work TUC has been doing to investigate opportunities to expand the missional possibilities using the properties for which TUC has oversight.

Initial work enabled conception of redeveloped childcare centres which would almost double the current childcare capacity. This could also allow space in the area surrounding the church, for other missional activities. The church building would not be redeveloped.

To better understand the feasibility of this potential, the project group, through Matthew Neale as our paid project leader, engaged Reg Gully to undertake a financial analysis.

Bev Homel's legal expertise and experience on the TUC team, which also included Rob Hubbard and Matt Smith.

As part of that completed MOU, TUC has missional access to the child-care centres to provide chaplaincy / pastoral services to the childcare centre communities. A Mission Partnership Committee Charter has been developed to clarify this, with a minimum of two meetings annually between UEEL, Child Care Centre leaders and Matt Smith and Clare Hankamer representing TUC.

Additionally, three-monthly meetings with UEEL have begun to oversee the financial performance of the childcare centres.

The report analysed and presented different 10 year cash flows under different levels of risk. The mid-point is financially viable but of course means recognising and managing the range of risks, including a significant loan.

Our Presbytery has been given an overview and UEEL has been briefed during the development of the MOU and subsequently. Both are strongly supportive of this initiative, especially in the focus on greater missional opportunities.

Added to this is the concept of including childcare facilities for physically challenged children (e.g. hearing impaired). This proposal has recently been initiated by Stuart Dempster who is UCA Qld Synod's

Executive Director, **Business** new Enterprises & Innovation.

#### Where does this leave TUC?

More analysis needs to be done to properly consider Stuart Dempster's proposal.

If the overall proposal were to proceed, four significant elements would need to be undertaken:

- 1. Once a fully developed proposal was available, approval to fund the needed loan would need to be provided by Queensland Synod (Finance, Investment & Property Board)
- 2. A more detailed building/redevelopment plan would need to be developed.
- 3. Brisbane City Council would need to provide town planning and building (development) approval. (Elements 2 and 3 may cost \$150,000 to \$200,000)
- 4. Before any of 1, 2 and 3, the TUC Congregation would need approve progressing.

A presentation is planned at our Annual General Meeting on 27 March to provide more details and allow questions, discussion and feedback.

### Into 2022

As we grow into the new year with continued blessings and learning from the previous times, we pray that our focus remains on our loving heavenly Father. We pray in thanks for our minister Matt, that God will continue to use him as our guide and lead us as a congregation and as individuals, closer to Him. On this platform we pray, we can be positioned to serve each other and our community and perhaps others can be encouraged into God's kingdom. Then, with God's grace, we can live out our mission as the Light of Christ for all the World.

This was a very challenging start for her with a lot of additional regulations: including toy cleaning after every session, but she led the group with great energy, love, creativity and care for playgroup families. Please continue to pray for Rui and Felix and their work on the Sunshine Coast.

In July, we welcomed Pam Bennett as our new Friday Coordinator and Pam too has taken on the extra burden of cleaning as well as leading the group with great professionalism and skill. Pam is a teacher with wonderful creativity and pastoral skills and we are very privileged to have her as part of the Ministry Team. Please see her report below.

Let's thank God for His provision in this important ministry of the church.

I had the great privilege of running Alpha with two of the playgroup mums last year. They both described it as an amazing journey of faith. I hope to invite Aine and Jill to share their experience of Alpha with you.



Alpha was first developed in the UK as a way of providing a safe place for people who have little or no background in the church to ask the big questions of life such as: 'who is Jesus?' and 'why did He die?' It is now run worldwide. It is traditionally run as an evening event with a shared dinner and the Alpha video, followed by discussion and prayer.

This is a difficult time for parents of young children to meet. So, I've found that online sessions can work effectively during lunch hour for busy mums, while young children have their afternoon nap and before school pickup. We then arrange to meet face to face for the sessions on the Holy Spirit.

We have started another Alpha Course this term for the Playgroup teams with Pam and I. This will equip leaders to be able to run Alpha for Playgroup families in the future. It has again been a wonderful journey together as we have asked the big questions of life and faith and shared testimonies together. I would love your prayers.

We share Bible stories and Christian songs with the families at both Playgroups and, over the last year, it has been a great time of celebration of God's love and hugely exciting sharing in worship with the children.

We see many families struggling and the pandemic has left families feeling isolated. Families have lost loved ones overseas to covid and some have suffered under domestic and family violence. This year, families have struggled with the loss of

property from the floods and others have loved ones impacted by the war in Ukraine.

We have also seen families experience amazing healings, reaching out to care for children orphaned by the pandemic in India and seeking prayer, trusting in God to provide for them.

We know God's kingdom is at work, don't we? But I want to encourage you to keep asking Our Heavenly Father to grow His kingdom here.

Thank you for your faithful prayers. I sincerely believe Jesus has graciously opened parent's hearts to His love and we pray that He will feed them and grow their faith during this time.

Please continue to pray for these precious families.

#### Friday Playgroup Coordinator Report - Pam Bennett

It has been such a joy to coordinate Friday Playgroup! Clare provided such helpful guidance when I first started, which set me up to now make adjustments as needed to reflect my strengths and the needs of the group. The Friday playgroup is made up of mostly mums, with some grandparents and dads. It is mostly babies under one and two to four year olds who attend. The group of caregivers who attend are all very friendly, and there seems to be a good culture of welcoming new comers and trying to build relationships. This is definitely a strength in the group! I often see a large group of parents sitting with their babies all chatting and enjoying each other's company. When I first started there were usually five to six families attending regularly, now there are usually ten or more families each week. As Covid restrictions have eased, I think it has

been easier for people to attend regularly. The volunteers play such an important role in making playgroup run well. The two volunteers that I usually have on a Friday are wonderful at welcoming people and offering help when needed. They are so efficient in the cleaning process at the end of each session as well. I miss them when they're not there! It may be helpful to have a few more volunteers available if needed, as sometimes the regular volunteers can't make it. Please pray that I will be able to foster a sense of genuine community at Playgroup, and for some new volunteers.

#### **CARE & CONNECT**

Caring and Connecting, Creating Community

Throughout 2021, the Prayer and Care Team (PACT) and the Cluster Companions cared for others through practical actions and by praying for individuals and their needs. Some face-to-face connections continued with visits to hospital and aged care; however, much contact was made through texts, emails and telephone calls due to various COVID restrictions in the community.

Care & Connect looks forward to re-energising and revitalising in 2022. We pray that our teams will continue to base our connecting and caring on TUC's values of 'community' and 'sharing' where people are cared for in practical and spiritual ways; and where we create opportunities to share our faith with others through word and action.

#### **LOVETOOWONG**

LoveToowong Probity Committee

Due to the generosity of the TUC congregation, \$26,000 has been distributed to people in need since April 2020. In 2020, the LOVETOOWONG Fund was largely used to assist people who were unemployed due to COVID. However, during 2021, people gradually gained work and remaining donations have been used to assist several families who struggled to afford basics including food, fuel and clothing.



The Probity Team met throughout the year and into 2022, to make considered decisions about the use of the Fund. Currently, the Team is considering how remaining funds would be best utilised to serve the community, as well as whether the LOVETOOWONG Fund may form the basis of continuing support for local families in the future.

All this was difficult at first, but we wanted our guests to feel safe and be safe.

We had a large and enthusiastic team for 2021. Each member had their defined role so the morning just flowed and was much fun. Matthew Smith was the master of "everything" and Quiz Master Extraordinaire!

The **Bakers** were: Dr Karen Abbey who not only baked for each monthly morning tea over four years, but also baked GF cookies for two years for morning tea after the Sunday church service. So much appreciated Dr Karen!; Lauren Asimus who baked every month as well as laundering the table cloths all year - such a special lady!; the girls, Isabel Smith and Kahlia Gearing who were such an asset to the Baking Team and a personal help to me. completed the Covid dine-in training and I hope they will continue to bake as they are

so talented and loved by us all). Narelle Waverley Smith, Vanessa Sheen, Jane T and Wendy G were also part of the baking team. Dianne H took charge of *Registration* and Covid Forms, while Laurel, Jane and Jill Lam saw the guests to their seats and assisted with delivering tea and coffee. The *Kitchen/Bathroom* cleaners were Jane, Dianne, Wendy, Grace Tan and Laurel Asimus. Peter Asimus and Rob Johnson cleared and cleaned tables and chairs and Rob managed the vacuuming.

We were treated to a wide range of speakers over 2021.

17 March: Paul Anderson, Vice Chairman of the Ecumenical Coffee Brigade gave us an insight into the dedicated efforts of the volunteers, supporting the homeless and marginalized people in Brisbane CBD by offering them food and a hot drink. They have been operating for 52 years, seldom missing a morning.

**21 April:** We participated in a 'Chef's tasting' run by nutritionist Dr Karen Abbey and her research assistant Miss Ge Ge. The topic was the importance of protein in food, and our comments provided feedback to manufacturers providing meals to the aged care sector.

**19 May**: Tea, excellent coffee and delicious eats were served, while the focus of the morning was "Chatting", by request.

**16 June:** We once again had plenty of time to chat before attempting a fun quiz prepared by our talented QUIZ MASTER.

**18 July:** Mal Campbell, a founder of Timor Children's Foundation and dentist by day, gave an excellent presentation about his trips to East Timor giving free, life-changing dental work to children there. Interviewed by Matt, Sarah had many interesting stories to share with us, leaving many of us wondering how on earth one family could manage so many children! I was spoilt for my birthday by this 'bumper' morning tea - a special guest and topic, plus cupcake birthday cakes made by Isabel Smith and Kahlia Gearing. Laurel Asimus and Dr Karen also made eats!

**17** November: For our Christmas Community Tea we were exceptionally fortunate to have Lea Yettica-Paulson, First Partnership Coordinator **Nations** Outback Futures as speaker. Lea's ties to 'country' are in North/Central Queensland with Birriah and Wangan nations; as well as Northern New South Wales with Bundjalung and Kamilaroi nations. Lea sees her role as working alongside local First Nations organizations and families to encourage and empower them. Outback Futures is committed to becoming an agent creating intergenerational change among indigenous communities. She gave us an insight into the Stolen Generation, as well as how important families are and how they look after each other, their "mob".

On this day we celebrated our precious **Dot Beavis's 90**<sup>th</sup> **birthday** with a cake and Christmas eats. She is such a special lady and much loved.

Early in the year, we leaders noted that what we are offering in English Conversation is not just language practice. #### 4. Mission

### 5. Administration
